FINALLY...A LIFE-TIME DIET THAT REALLY WORKS!



Greetings in the Name of Jesus Christ, Our Lord and Only Savior!

Our 18th century Methodist forefather, Rev. John Wesley, was ordained as a priest in the Anglican Church of England. Early on, Wesley believed three fundamental pillars guided Christians in their walk with Christ. His guiding principles

for believers were scripture, tradition and reason. Through his later interactions with a group of Moravian Christians, John Wesley added a fourth pillar-principle, experience. For United Methodists, scripture, tradition, reason and experience are often referred to as the Wesley quadrilateral. This month I want us to investigate John Wesley's first pillar, God's revealed Word, the Holy Scriptures. Wesley saw the scriptures as God's primary means of grace in the lives of all Christians, including us.

John Wesley's quest and desire for a deep and personal relationship with God prompted him to search and study scripture throughout his lifetime. He believed the scriptures were the only acceptable and reliable standard truth for Christians. For us who are contemporary United Methodists, The Book of Discipline of the United Methodist Church clearly states John Wesley's high view of the reliability of the Bible. The 2012 edition of our Discipline states it well: "Scripture is the primary source and criterion for Christian doctrine."

So, what does this mean for us today? Our commitment to the authority of God's Word implies several key factors for believers. It means the testimony and written record of the authors of the books of the Bible are true and reliable. It means that when the scriptures state that the Holy Spirit breathed upon and illuminated the writers, we can believe it. It means that when God disclosed himself to humanity through the life, death and resurrection of His Son Jesus, we can believe it. It means that because God's Spirit inspired each author, the entire Bible is trustworthy

and we can believe it. Because it is God's revelation of truth to humanity, we can believe it. The authority of scripture is unquestionable; the Bible is reliable. It is wholly true and trustworthy in all that it affirms.

How does all this relate to 21st century United Methodists in our own Christian journey? Like John Wesley, we need to faithfully read and search the scriptures. The Apostle Peter said it well: "Like newborn babies, you must crave spiritual milk, so that you will grow into a full experience of salvation. Cry out for this nourishment" (I Peter 2:2 NLT). Peter was not writing to young converts only. He was addressing all followers of Christ in their various stages of salvation and discipleship. Young, middler or older, we must all hunger and thirst when we read and search the word of God. Like Wesley, it is a lifetime journey of search-and-grow.

When we approach God's Word, our faith must be a hungry faith. We must search God's Word with a famishing thirst. If we truly desire to grow into a full experience of salvation, our search of the scripture never ends. The search is constant and life-long. The joyful reward is this: Our search will become God's means of grace to us and also to others. Infants never become healthy adults when fed junk food or poison. In the same way, the healthy Christian's spiritual diet must consistently be the pure, undiluted Word of God. Jesus said it clearly: "Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled. (Matthew 5:6). Do you truly hunger for spiritual food? Do you truly desire to know the full presence of God? Do you crave to store up God's precious Word in the memory bank of your heart? If your spirit is responding "Yes, Lord! This is what I truly want and desire," I offer you this call to action: Cry out for the spiritual nourishment God graciously offers to you through reading and searching the scriptures, the Spirit-breathed Word of God. Do not wait; begin today.



Where did the use of acolytes originate?

Acolytes have been part of the church in one form or another from the earliest times.

The word acolyte comes from the Greek word akolouthos, meaning follower, helper, or assistant. By the middle ages, acolytes were a clerical order. Acolytes may have any number of helping functions. They may carry the light, processional cross, banners, or Bible. They may also assist the pastor or other worship leaders with communion, baptism and other duties. Children and youth often serve as acolytes, but adults may serve as well.

"Jesus said: 'I am the light of the world" (John 8:12 NRSV). The presence of the light reminds us of Jesus coming into our world and into our lives. The light is carried into the worship service as a symbol of Jesus coming into the presence of the worshiping community.

Many congregations use two candles on the Lord's table. While the original use of such candles was simply to provide enough light for the presider to see the communion liturgy well enough to pray it, some also came to see those two candles as a reminder of the dual nature of Jesus, both human and divine. At the end of the service, the light carried out into the world is a sign that Jesus Christ is for all people everywhere, and that Christ goes with his people into the world where serve as his living body.
