

Where is the Church Finding Its Answers?



race and peace to you in the name of Jesus Christ, who is the faithful witness, the firstborn from the dead, and the ruler of the kings of the earth! I hope you and your family are experiencing a refreshing penitential journey in God's presence this Lenten season as we await the great Resurrection celebration.

7 billion people in today's world are asking several milliondollar questions, ones that arise from the difficult and confusing day-to-day experiences of life. Sometimes the right

answers to these questions sound judgmental, unfriendly, and misleading. Some seemingly effective answers can compound the problem instead, leading to reluctance by many to seek the right answers. Unfortunately, the Church, which by nature ought to influence the rest of the world, often appears to be a ship without a rudder. As a witness to God's work on earth, the Church must listen to Christ so that it can sail in right direction and prophetically respond to people's needs.

What does this mean? Being a witness is to Jesus Christ." impossible apart from listening. And the world will not want the answers the Church can offer if the Church does not have a strong, clear message that addresses its dilemmas. In other words, the real challenge is not merely professing to be Christ's witnesses, but witnessing to what He has actually said. The Church must not listen to any other voice for direction.

This tendency to listen to multiple voices (including our own inner voice) for direction was shown by the Apostle Peter on the mount of the transfiguration. On that beautiful day, Jesus had taken three of His disciples—Peter, John, and James with Him to Mount Tabor to pray. Luke tells us that while Jesus was praying, something supernatural happened—"... the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became as bright as a flash of lightning. 30 Two men, Moses and Elijah,

appeared in glorious splendor, talking with Jesus. 31They spoke about his departure, which he was about to bring to fulfillment at Jerusalem." On one hand, the mountaintop experience was to reassure Jesus Christ of the joy set before Him as He awaited His crucifixion. On the other hand, it was meant to reveal to Peter, John, and James a glimpse of who Jesus truly was. And along with Jesus in His glory, they saw Moses and Elijah. But Peter misunderstood the essence of the mountaintop experience when he suggested building three shelters: 33... "Master, it is good for us to be here. Let us put up three shelters—one for you, one for Moses and one for Elijah..." Luke notes that Peter did not know what he was saying. How did God react to Peter's request? 34While he was speaking, a cloud appeared and covered them, and they were afraid as they entered the cloud. ³⁵A voice came from the cloud, saying, "This is

my Son, whom I have chosen; listen to him."

Friends, in this sudden interruption to correct the Apostle Peter's request, God made it clear to Peter that though he saw Moses and Elijah talking with Jesus, in no way were they equal. Building three shelters would be an equalizer that could not happen! So God said, "This is my Son, whom I have chosen; listen to him." Did you notice that the words were still on Peter's lips when God interrupted with both cloud and voice? The meaning is clear. God takes seriously the matter of who the Church listens to. It does not matter who and what they claim to represent. If God has not authorized them to speak on His behalf, the Church has the

responsibility to discern who sent them.

In these last days, many unauthorized and ungodly voices want the Body of Christ to listen to them for direction. Unfortunately, they have misled many Christians and denominations. Do not be deceived. If the Church must remain relevant, if our families must get it right, if you and I must fulfill our calling and election, if the world must listen to us, then we must listen to Jesus Christ. May we fearlessly pay more attention to what Jesus is saying and be courageous to obey Him. Amen.

THE MIRACLE of life



My name is Terry Smith. I am 80 years old and have been married to my wonderful wife Rebecca for almost 61 years. I was raised in a Christian home and have not strayed from the church or my faith. I believe God has blessed me with many miracles, including the most recent miracle of life.

Last November, even though I thought I was in good health, after several tests, a cardiologist told me I needed "routine" open-heart bypass surgery. I was told the surgery would give me many more years of healthy living. The surgery was scheduled. Before I went for the surgery, my pastor administered the Holy Communion to

me three times and told me that God would be in the surgery room with me and through the recovery journey.

The original surgery went well, but six days later, I had internal bleeding and was rushed back into surgery and was opened back up. My heart stopped but the doctors were able to get it restarted. Because of blood clots, I had a stroke. I survived the surgery.

I spent the next month in a rehabilitation hospital learning how to walk and use my right side. While all this went on, the church was praying fervently for me. During one of my appointments, my surgeon's nurse told me, "You are a godly miracle!" Indeed, I am a godly miracle!

I believe I am alive and walking today because of God's mercy and His interceding actions with my terrific doctors. My family, my church family, my pastor and his family, our church prayer group, and all my Christian friends petitioned God day and night on my behalf. God listened and then granted me the gift of a new life! Glory be to God!



MISSION OF THE MONTH

We recently received this note from C.C.'s Closet: "Thank you for your generous donation of \$500. It will go a long way to meet clothing needs for Miami County's children and families. You have been a regular donor and we can't express adequately how much your faithfulness to this ministry means." Since 2017 C.C.'s Closet has served the needs of Miami County's foster children as well as Miami County adults and children who are in need, but not in the foster care system. C.C.'s collects donations of new and gently-used clothing, shoes, toiletries, and baby gear. Monetary donations are used to buy toiletries, pajamas, underwear, socks, diapers, wipes, and other basic needs. Often when children are removed from homes by the Department of Child Services, they have nothing other than the clothes on their backs. C.C.'s fills in the gaps to ensure these children have their


a Christmas program providing Christmas presents for children in foster

Created by Rev. Sam, Next Gen is a group of Main Street members who are in their 40s and 50s. This group was created to live as the missional bridge through which people can connect with God, to meet, and act purposefully to ensure that Main Street not only survives, but thrives in the coming years through practical evangelism and discipleship. In order to begin this lifelong journey, the first group of Next Gen had a three-week seminar on how to confidently share their faith through the various platforms God has given them. Resource persons were Dr. Samuel Odubena and Dr. W. Jay Moon. Dr. Moon is a professor of Church Planting and Evangelism at Asbury Theological Seminary, Wilmore, KY. The seminar was sponsored by Knox Fellowship. Read what some of the participants are saying:

"I feel God's presence in my life holding my hand every step of the way. He is always with me, and I know that if I listen, he will guide me during my daily life. I grew up in a Christian family and accepted Christ as my Savior at an early age. However, there have been times in my life when I "took the wheel:" instead of "fully" following God. I learned that there is more to being a Christian than just going to church on Sundays. I learned so many things from the seminar. One of the key points was that accepting Christ as my Savior and Lord is just the beginning of a lifetime journey. As disciples of Christ, God expects us to study His Word, grow in our knowledge and understanding of Him, and make other disciples of Christ." – Claire

"After participating in the Next Gen seminar I truly discovered many new nuggets from the Bible on true discipleship. I also compared myself to a 'bone' from my body which God made. The last three years I have been broken in many different ways emotionally and physically but I have hope because God made bones to heal and I believe in the Lord for my healing and it is well with my soul. Though I've known that Jesus had twelve disciples, God brought to light that it was ONLY twelve disciples that God used to initially spread the Gospel. Secondly, I learned evangelism is genuine discipleship." – Julie

"I really enjoyed The Next Gen seminar and the group. I appreciate Sam's knowledge and ability to teach. I have a much clearer picture of what it means to be a disciple. I am around people all the time and I need to be much more aware of opportunities I may have to help people find Christ. I am excited about learning how to do this the way God wants me to. 


